

In this hands-on workshop, you will learn how to choose the right books for your project, page manipulation and folding techniques plus ways to design one of a kind sculptural piece. Participants will learn how to create symmetrical and asymmetrical designs, books that can hang and those that serve as stand-alone sculptural pieces and ways to display their finished pieces.



### NY AG LITERACY WEEK MARCH 21-25



In celebration of National Agriculture Week (March 21-25), volunteers throughout the state will read a book with an agricultural theme to second graders. The selected book for 2022 is *Farmer Will Allen and the Growing Table*, written by Jacqueline Briggs Martin, and art by Eric-Shabazz Larkin

Agriculture is a unifying factor for communities all over. Whether you have 100 acres or a rooftop, there are opportunities for growing food and sharing the journey from soil to table with those around, as illustrated in Farmer Will Allen and the Growing Table. This book will take students on an explorative journey learn about community gardens and inspire them to build communities through food, even if they only have a pot on their porch to cultivate.

Will Allen is no ordinary farmer. A former basketball star, he's as tall as his truck, and he can hold a cabbage, or a basketball, in one hand. But what is most special about Farmer Will is that he can see what others can't see. When he looked at an abandoned city lot he saw a huge table, big enough to feed the whole world. No space, no problem. Poor soil, there's a solution. Need help, found it. Farmer Will is a genius in solving problems. Jacqueline Briggs Martin tells the inspiring story of an innovator, educator, and community builder. Combined with artist Eric-Shabazz Larkin's striking artwork, readers will share Will Allen's optimism and determination to bring good food to every table. This story also showcases the unique diversity of agricultural operations that is especially applicable to New York's combination of rural, suburban, and urban landscapes.

Horse Communications and Public Presentation night will be offered on two dates with a virtual or in person option. You will need to register for an assigned time to limit the amount of people in the building at one time. Registrations for the presentations are due to the 4-H office no later than **February 18**. Go to https://bit.ly/4H2022PublicPresentation or call the office. We need to have the names of each 4-H member who will be doing a presentation and the title of the presentation when you register.

Learning to give effective public presentations is one unique advantage of belonging to 4-H. Presentations should have an obvious connection to the 4-H program. Therefore, if your members are unsure of what topic to select, encourage them to try one that deals with a 4-H project that they are already familiar with. That way they can concentrate on the actual presentation because they do not have to worry about learning new content material. This will also help to reinforce the knowledge they have already learned.

Public Presentation Categories:

- Formal Speech
- Demonstration /Illustrated Talk
- Recitations and Dramatic Interpretations
- Interview 4-H youth can get a head start on preparing for a job or college interview by participating in the New York State 4-H Public Speaking Program's Interview Process. The oral presentation will be the actual interview using questions selected from a set list. The written presentation documents will be submitted for judging prior to the face-to-face interview.

#### FALL 2021 4-H GOVERNMENT INTERN PROGRAM

The 4-H Government Intern Program, sponsored by the Herkimer County Legislature and administered by Cornell Cooperative Extension 4-H Youth Development Program of Herkimer County, was back in person this fall, after having to cancel half way through in the spring of 2020 due to COVID-19. Four students from three Herkimer County school districts participated by exploring current issues and learning more about the functions of their county government through the committee system. Students reviewed issues, toured county facilities, interviewed county legislators, and attended a county legislature meeting.

Students included **Jayda Estey** from Dolgeville High School; **Amaya Chabrier** and **Cheyenne Garlock**, from Herkimer High School; and **Luca Bellino** from Frankfort / Schuyler High School.

Key presenters involved in the success of this program included: **Jim Bono**, Chairman of the Herkimer County Legislature; **Joann Mower** of the P.I.N.S. Unit; Budget Officer **Sheri Ferdula**; **Kim S. Tranter** and **Rob Drumm** from the Board of Elections; **Linda Patten** from the Department of Social Services; Probation Department; Herkimer County Clerk **Sylvia Rowan**; **Kim Enea** County Treasurer and Family Court Judge **Thad Luke**.

At the final session, the interns staged a simulated legislative mock meeting and provided presentations on current issues confronting county government. Topics discussed were:

- Entertainment needs for Youth in Herkimer County
- Fundraising for remodel of Youth Centers
- Peer mentoring in schools

Youth thanked all of the participating Herkimer County Legislators for their visits and help in researching topics that made the program an engaging experience.



#### In Their Own Words

When I joined 4-H, I was looking for an afterschool activity to attend. A friend of mine recommended Youth CAN to me in 10th grade. For two years, we worked on projects that really gave me the opportunity and taught me to share my ideas and speak up for my ideas. By working on different projects, I learned to speak clearly about my ideas—and I got lots of public speaking experience. My 4-H leaders always encouraged me to try new things—things that I had never done before. I began to deeply understand the disadvantages that some people have experienced in certain areas—such as what is and is not accessible to them. And I began to learn what people can do to help their community.

One important thing I learned through 4-H Youth CAN is the importance of bringing awareness to issues that affect a lot of people. For instance, during my time in 4-H, our group worked on a homelessness project, the Community and Police Speak Out and a Black Lives Matter project. Through these projects I learned to handle conflicts much better, and how to think creatively and solve problems more effectively. Most important, I learned to care more about my community—and what I could do to help my community.

I believe NYS 4-H should reach out to smaller, unnoticed clubs to share what we do and how others can contribute. I also think that NYS 4-H should work on becoming more diverse. NYS 4-H clubs need to be accessible to everyone and let others reap the benefits of learning how to bring prominent issues to the community's attention. I think this will help all young people build life skills that will benefit them in the future.


