What do Master Gardeners do?

- Address horticultural inquires via email phone
- Write articles about gardening
- Set up demonstration activities in public places
- Consult on school gardens
- Community improvement projects
- Historic garden restoration
- Horticultural therapy
- Organize plant sales and public events
- County Fair information/outreach
- Increase awareness and management of invasive species, water quality conservation, and other environmental issues

What are the qualifications to become a Master Gardener?

A basic **interest** and **knowledge** about landscape and food gardening

Enthusiasm for acquiring and **sharing** horticultural knowledge and skills

Interest in **teaching** others

Ability to communicate information

Understanding of Cornell Cooperative Extension's educational mission

Flexible time schedule to allow participation in the program

Willingness to **volunteer** time on horticultural programming and functions



Complete a 50-hour course in general (consumer) horticulture designed for Master Gardener Volunteer Trainees. The next training will take place in Fall 2024.

Classes typically are held on 10 consecutive Mondays, 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., thus far in Cooperstown. Some classes may be held at SUNY Cobleskill. Instructors include extension educators / horticulture specialists, college professors, agency directors, Master Gardeners, and landscape professionals.

Topics include: Basic Plant Pathology, Soils, Composting, Garden Botany, Annuals & Perennials, Herbs, Basic Entomology, Organic Gardening, Permaculture Gardening, Large and Small Fruits, Trees and Shrubs, Pruning, Ecological Lawn Care, Nuisance Wildlife, Invasive Species, Beekeeping, and Garden-Based Learning,

Upon course completion, Master Gardener 'Apprentices' are expected to complete 50 hours of Master Gardener Volunteer service within a twelve month period. Times may include committee work/meetings, grounds, helpline, plant sale, and outreach activities.
